

MAINE PEOPLE'S RESOURCE CENTER PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY


Methodology

- A survey of 905 likely Maine voters was conducted by interactive voice response from November 1st through 3rd, 2012. Calls were made at different times of day to maximize the diversity of possible respondents. Questions were recorded by a female interviewer.
- Survey results were mathematically weighted by gender, age and geographic area to ensure an accurate representation of the population being surveyed. The sample was not weighted by party or ideology.
- The margin of error of this survey is 3.26%, 95 times out of 100. Subsamples may have a larger margin of error.
- Frequencies and percentages may not always add up to the total number of responses or to 100%, due to weighting and rounding.


LePage Approval


President

If the election for President were held today, who would you vote for?






President by Congressional District

If the election for U.S Senate were held today, who would you vote for?






First Congressional District

If there were an election for Congress today and the candidates were Democrat Chellie Pingree and Republican Jon Courtney, who would you vote for?



Second Congressional District


If there were an election for Congress today and the candidates were Democrat Mike Michaud and Republican Kevin Raye, who would you vote for?
